


Her second love:



Youth Philanthropy Initiative

The Youth Philanthropy Initiative was launched once again with our S3 pupils on Friday 9 September 2016 by Alistair Cairns from YPI when he talked to the year group about philanthropic activity and challenged the pupils to think about how they could be philanthropic in their actions and how that could benefit the Paisley community. That Friday afternoon then played host to a Charity Fair which was attended by a variety of 14 local and national charities. The pupils were then all fired up and ready to identify the social cause that touched them the most and challenged to find a charity that supported their cause. The pupils then spent several weeks researching the work of the chosen charity, arranging visits to the charity and interviewing charity representatives. The pupils pulled all of their work together to then compete in class finals, presenting the case for their chosen charity to win £3,000. The groups had to focus on the impact that the £3,000 donation would have to families within the Renfrewshire area.

Brightest Star, a charity that provides support to families following the death of a child at any age, from any cause of death, successfully secured £3,000 as Beth Scott, Rachel Shaw, Lucy Quinn, Daisy Randall, Connie Renton gave a hard hitting presentation on the work of the charity and how they had personally been affected by what they had learnt about the charity. The following has been taken from Brightest Star's Facebook page:

"Today I was deeply moved by 6 teenage girls who came to visit Hulks Haven. These 6 young girls gave up a morning of their school holidays to come to find out about the work of Brightest Star for a project at their school, Gleniffer High School. They had already researched lots of information on Brightest Star and they weren't phased to talk about children dying or grief. I really wish we could educate more young people to know that dying is a normal part of life and its ok to grief the loss of a loved one. After watching my video on why we donate bears to bereaved families and mortuaries, these girls went to the shops, made and donated bear factory bears to Brightest Star. That is what you call a caring, selfless act from our young people and I am touched beyond belief. As a society, we should appreciate the unsung, unheard good acts that so many of our young people carry out of a daily basis."





Mr. Bilsland, Fifth Year Lauren Ferry and Sixth Year Amy Simpson recently participated in the Holocaust Educational Trust's "Lessons from Auschwitz" project. They attended two half-day seminars in Glasgow and subsequently visited the former Nazi extermination camp of Auschwitz-Birkenau.

Auschwitz

Mr. Bilsland answered the following questions about their experiences.

"What can you tell the new about the history of Auschwitz?"

Auschwitz is in Poland and before the Second World War it was called Oswiecim. When the Nazis took over Poland in 1939 they called the town Auschwitz, and used the army barracks and converted them into a concentration camp. The camp is where the Nazis sent people that they said were undesirable. These were groups of people such as Romanian travelers, Catholics, homosexuals and Jewish people. Overall around 1.6 million people were killed there the majority of the victims were Jewish. These camps are now open today for visitors to look round, and being in such a place is a haunting experience.

"What is the Holocaust Educational Trust?"

The Holocaust Education Trust is an organisation that works within schools and colleges and communities across the country, to try and improve people's knowledge and understanding of the holocaust. It also aims to help people understand the relevance that the holocaust still has in today's society. The Holocaust Education Trust also works against racism, anti-Semitism, and the prejudices that there are still today.

"What is the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project?"

The Holocaust Education Trust has set up the Lessons from Auschwitz project in order to educate people of the Holocaust. They also aim to show people that the events of the Holocaust are still relevant today. The Lessons from Auschwitz project, takes teachers and two pupils from each school across Scotland and runs two seminars with them, and takes them on a day trip to Auschwitz. Throughout the trip the students are given lots of support by the teachers and the staff who work for Lessons from Auschwitz.

What did you have to do?

To take part in the project, we all had to go to an orientation seminar in Glasgow which was about a week before we went out to Poland for the day. In this seminar we were introduced to the themes and key messages that the Holocaust Education Trust wished to put across to us, and we also had some ice breakers within our groups, as obviously we had never met before and we would all be going through as life changing experiment together with in the next week. After this we then had Eva Clark give a survivor testimony. Her testimony was shocking and at the same time the most amazing thing I had ever listened to, as when learning about the Holocaust before the pupils who were in my group had never really thought much about the people that had survived and would have to live with the memories for the rest of their life. After this we then returned home and a week later we were on our way to Glasgow Airport at 4.30am in the morning to catch the flight to Poland

What messages have you taken from the trip?

We have taken a lot away from our experience of taking part in Lessons from Auschwitz; it was an amazing experience, at the same time horrifying and extremely humbling.

The main message we would like to pass on, is that we should not look at the mass number of people that were affected by the Holocaust, but the individual people that were affected. All of their individual lives stopped. Their families ripped apart. These

were just normal people who lost their lives because of prejudice.

scheme run by the HET provides an excellent opportunity for students to discover more about this terrible period in 20th century history. In allowing students to actually visit Auschwitz and also meet witnesses it provides an invaluable opportunity for them to go some small way in trying to understand the Holocaust. The school has been participating for several years now and I have always been impressed by how much students gain from the experience and then pass on what they have learned to




Merry Christmas from the PTA

In February 2017, Gleniffer High School will be celebrating their 10 year anniversary of their partnership with Dzenza Primary School in Malawi. Over the past ten years Gleniffer High School has achieved a lot, facilitated the development of an orchard, built two toilet blocks (boys and girls), refurbished nine classrooms and seen two expeditions from the school travel to Dzenza in 2014 and 2016. The selection process for the Malawi 2018 expedition has now taken place, we hear from Keira and Grace to see how they got on.



Q. Keira, Grace, how do you feel now that you have been selected for Malawi 2018?

A. "Fantastic, being selected for the Malawi 2018 expedition was an exceptional achievement for both of us."

Q. What did you have to do to be selected?

A. "To be selected we had to attend a few meetings, write a bit about yourself, it asked questions such as our hobbies and why we want to go to Malawi. Finally, we had to take part in a 'selection afternoon' where we were put through team building activities with the teachers looking on to see how we preformed in different tasks, it also gave us an opportunity to meet and chat to the other potential candidates and get to know them. 



Mr Nicholls accompanied the group in what is the 10th year since the link was re-established. We were given a wonderful welcome by the pupils and staff of Hans Böckler Schule who were there to meet the group on the first day. Mrs Quinn and Mrs McNicol also accompanied the group who left on Monday, 5th December and returned on Monday, 12th December.

There was great excitement as pupils left the school on Monday morning to travel by coach to Edinburgh airport and onwards to Munich and coach transfer to Fürth. The group stayed in the very comfortable youth hostel in Nuremberg in its magnificent setting overlooking the world famous Christmas market. There were many excursions, including a day trip to Munich and its beautiful city centre and a group visit to the Allianz Arena. Pupils enjoyed the wonderful Christmas markets in Rothenburg, a walled medieval town which looked just like a setting from a Christmas card.
