## Departments in the Spotlight



## **Business & Computing**

#### National 5 Retail Class

Over this coming session we are offering a new 'Skills for Work' course in our Business and Computing faculty – National 5 Retailing.

While studying this course, our pupils have the opportunity to gain a national qualification through developing a wide range of skills, knowledge and attitudes required for learning, life and work.

One exciting area of the course is the planning and implementation of events. Since the change of timetable at the beginning of June, the class could not wait to get started and have already ran their first successful retail event - a tuck shop at our School Show.

The tuck shop was a roaring success and the pupils conducted themselves in an extremely professional manner – well done!

The class have lots of ideas for events this coming session, which they keep you updated with in the school's next newsletter.

Below you can hear from some of the pupils in the class, about their reasons for studying this new course and what they hope to get out of it.

#### Mirin Stewart (S6)

I want to get an extra qualification by studying this course because it will help me in the near future when applying for jobs. So far I have enjoyed working with the team and completing lots of team building activities, allowing me to know the class better.

#### Caitlin Muir (S6)

I currently have a part-time job in the retail sector and hope that by studying this course I can learn more about the sector I work in and potentially progress in my career after school.

#### Skye Green (S6)

When I leave school I want to work as an Administrative Assistant, I thought that learning about interview skills and how to interact with customers will help me achieve this in this future. We have only been in this class for two weeks and I have already enjoyed the planning and running of the tuck shop, this was fun because I got to use lots of different skills.





### **Business & Computing**

#### S3 Business – Krispy Kreme

At the end of the course in May, our S3 business pupils applied what they had learned about customer services, production, finance, marketing (and much more!) to a real business – Krispy Kreme.

Over several weeks they explored the entire operation of Krispy Kreme and produced formal business reports of their findings. This was followed by a visit to the Krispy Kreme factory at Braehead, where the class were able to see what they had been learning about in action. The class also got to design and produce their very own doughnuts in the factory – understanding more about the life of a doughnut!

They were all a credit to the school and the staff at Krispy Kreme were impressed by what the class had discovered from their research – well done!



#### **S2** Computing Science - Science Centre Trip

A group of budding Computing Scientists from S2 enjoyed a great day at Glasgow Science Centre on 8<sup>th</sup> May. The pupils got to spend some time exploring the science mall and they participated in a workshop on encryption, frequency analysis and brute-force hacking attacks. The pupils learned how messages can be encrypted and how encryption can be broken before working together to crack a secret message. Good fun hands-on activities and information on careers in Cyber Security made for an enjoyable and motivational day!



### **Mathematics**

#### **Pupil Achievement in Maths**

This session pupils have continued to achieve success in a number of areas both within and outwith the school including Maths Week Scotland (MWS 2018), The SMC Enterprising Mathematics Competition and all UKMT Mathematical Challenges for individuals and teams.

There were many opportunities for our young people to develop their leadership skills with S4 – S6 Maths Champions supporting, encouraging and showing a positive attitude towards learning throughout MWS 2018. A group of S1-S3 pupils were actively involved in the maths department's contribution to the P7 Open Evening. They gave a presentation, answered questions from P7 pupils and parents and demonstrated learning and teaching approaches.

### **Mathematics**

#### P7 – S1 Transition

We have continued to build on the good relationships with our associated primary schools. This session our transition programme included:

- Coffee, Cake and Communication (CCC) meeting held after school involving primary 7 teachers, our transition teacher Mrs MacLeod and GHS maths teachers. This gave us an opportunity to have an informal dialogue around Maths teaching and learning, allowing time to further discuss pedagogy and to look at numeracy across learning.
- The P7 teachers joining S1 maths classes. As well as seeing their former pupils settled in GHS, further discussions to support pupils in their learning ensued.
- Another CCC meeting during the P7 induction days where S1 pupil progress was shared. We also continued our discussions on methodology and resources, with a view to developing common approaches across our cluster.
- Miss Thomson, Mr Madden and Mr MacCuish taught P7 pupils in their own schools whilst Ms Walker and Mrs MacLeod met with the P7 teachers.

The feedback from pupils and staff on the maths transition programme has been very positive and we look forward to welcoming our new S1 pupils in August.

**Department News** 

All staff have undertaken Concrete, Pictorial, Abstract and Language (CPAL) training. The CPAL approach values the use of concrete and pictorial materials to aid pupil understanding from S1 to S6. As well as the training, we have invested in a range of concrete resources for use across the maths and pupil support departments, with a focus on increasing pupil engagement and deepening mathematical understanding. This will continue to be a priority for the department and our associated primary schools next session.

#### German Exchange

#### Go4Set

Following the Celebration and Assessment Day for the Drummond Hub held at the University of the West of Scotland Paisley campus on 14<sup>th</sup> May our team, 'Always Green Energy' were declared the winners. They were presented with a trophy and certificate and went on to the Scottish final which was held at Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh on the 5<sup>th</sup> of June.

The feedback from the assessors at the Drummond Hub was the best that our mentor, Mike Young, and teacher Ms Campbell, have heard in all the years they have been involved with Go4SET. The team were complimented on their presentation skills and their ability to answer questions. In terms of their formal written submission certain elements would not have been out of place in a professional engineering report.

#### Go4SET Scottish Final - Update

Coinciding with World Environment Day this year's Scottish Final was held at Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh where we were up against the winners from the other seven hubs. Interestingly all the projects in the final were the same - Future-Proof: Designing Buildings for Climate Change.

Feedback from the assessors was again very positive with particular regard to the costing elements within the report. The assessors were impressed that these issues were tackled head on and that subsequently the team had gelled and worked well together.

Our congratulations go to Whitehill Secondary School from Glasgow who were the overall winners. Unlike the other teams they did not start with a blank sheet of paper and design a house from scratch they came up with a plan to upgrade the tenements in the area around their school. Whilst we may not have won, it is no mean achievement to have got to the last eight from a total of 91 schools from across Scotland.

CGC carpenter Andy Watson praised pupils for their enthusiasm and willingness to learn.

Contracts Manager Andy – returning to his old school – spent time showing the fourth year pupils how to do things like create a partition wall, hang doors and other joinery-related tasks.

Any Watson said: "I feel very privileged to have gone back to my former school where I learned such a lot. Showing young people joinery may help them make choices when it comes to picking a career. I hope they found the experience worthwhile."

Our visit was ideal timing because Gleniffer High School is currently undertaking a five week-long "enrichment programme" designed to offer pupils a range of employability skills.



Dave Palmer, Commercial Director of CGC, accompanied Andy along with colleague Gary Tracey, CGC's Finance Director.

Dave said: "CGC has a strong track record of helping communities where we operate as a business. Engaging with young people is one of the things we are most enthusiastic about and we want to thank Renfrewshire Council and Gleniffer High School for making Andy's visit happen."

Councillor John Shaw, Convener of Renfrewshire Council's Finance, Resources and Customer Services Policy Board, visited the school to see the pupils being taught by Andy.

For Andy, as a former pupil, sharing his experience will I'm sure have been invaluable for the pupils as they gain important employability skills. #### My World of Work Virtual 'Meet the Experts'

Gleniffer High School were given the opportunity to be one of the first schools in Scotland to take part in a Skills Development Scotland's pilot 'Virtual Meet the Expert' session as part of the My World of Work Live programme. The programme involves taking experts in a range of jobs roles and sectors into schools using video conferencing facilities so that pupils can learn more about jobs where there will be opportunities in the future.

Our expert for the session was Julie Cameron who works in a Quality and Regulatory role in Life Sciences. She delivered her half-hour session with a group of our S3 Biology students where they were able to ask questions about the role and qualification routes into current positions.

Following this successful pilot, we hope to be involved in further meet the expert sessions in a variety of industries.





#### **S5 Greenpower Challenge**

Renfrewshire Greenpower racing team "Scooby Dhu Racers" comprised of pupils from Gleniffer High and other Renfrewshire Schools, had their first racing experiences in March competing against teams from Glasgow, East Renfrewshire and Inverclyde. #### **S4 Enrichment**

During the exam period, pupils not sitting formal national qualification examinations took part in a 5week 'Enrichment' programme within the school. During enrichment, the pupils undertook a variety of activities aimed at improving their self-confidence, teamwork, life-skills and employability skills including first aid, money management and meal planning. In addition, during the 'Employability Week' pupils undertook a full series of employability activities including identifying skills, filling in applications, psychometric testing, attending the Renfrewshire Chamber of Commerce Business to Business event, making CVs and taking part in mock interviews. After the five week programme, pupils were given the opportunity to practice their skills with two weeks of extended work experience.







Pupils described the programme as "brilliant" and "very useful" one remarking that they felt "buzzing - can't wait 'til my next interview!". Thanks go to all the staff who supported the activities and volunteered to deliver workshops as well as the various employers such as Doosan Babcock, British Airways Maintenance Glasgow, JP Morgan and the British Army who presented and participated in the applications workshop and mock interviews.

#### College/Modern Apprenticeship Workshops.

The pupils were supported in completing applications and writing personal statements. Having the careers advisors on site while writing the applications was a valuable resource for our young people. On the back of our successful College Workshops, S4/5/6 pupils attended Modern Apprenticeship application workshops run again, by our Skills Development Scotland Careers Advisors. This years theme 'Skills for the Future', promoted the importance of investing in our workforce. Our Careers Advisers, Catriona Makeham and Nicola Keane are based in the school to give pupils the support they need to help plan for and manage their careers. They are also available to speak to parents at Parents' Evenings.

Through a combination of group sessions, one-to-one interviews and drop ins, they help pupils understand how their personality, interests and values are key to making the right career decisions. They also help pupils understand how to develop and use their talents and skills.

In recent weeks, they have been helping pupils apply for suitable jobs, apprenticeships and further and higher education opportunities.

We hope that many of our young people will continue to donate their time or thoughts to many of our local charities who so depend on support as they address so many social issues. ### **Outdoor Learning**

Pupils in 2.1 took advantage of the great weather in the middle of May and took their Geography learning outdoors. ### New S6 Induction Day

The purpose of the S6 Induction Day is to provide the pupils with a greater insight into the life of S6 at Gleniffer High School. Responsibility, leadership, teamwork, creativity and volunteering were the key messages throughout the day. The day kicked off with an information session on when and how to apply for apprenticeship opportunities and college by our Skills Development Scotland team.

The pupils learnt about the "Making Changes Together Initiative" with implementation due to begin in August 2019, Gleniffer High School is the first school in the authority to launch this. Lead by S6 pupils, involving all other year groups of the school, they meet at lunchtime to develop an initiative of their own on ways in which we can tackle poverty here in Renfrewshire, allowing pupils a voice in the changes they want to see to tackle poverty. The pupils would then record and evaluate their results before submitting a Gleniffer High School report of Recommendations to Renfrewshire Council. An exciting opportunity for our S6 pupils to lead on!

Miss Feggans and Miss Cameron talked about S6 life in terms of the Badgeholder positions, the House Captain role, the common room and how it will operate going forward. Study periods are now compulsory for all S6. In terms of volunteering all S6 pupils need to sign up for at least 2 periods of volunteering a week and ensure that they are regularly updating their volunteering hours through Saltire. UCAS hints and tips were given out as well as pupils being encouraged to use the summer to research their UCAS courses so that we can hit the ground running with the application process when the pupils return to school in August. Pupils were encouraged to follow the Gleniffer\_Pastoral twitter page to be keep updated with all important announcements.

It was then over to the Tree of Knowledge and their "Intriguing Futures" workshop which aims to actively motivate students to lead the session in preparation for the leadership they will apply not only in school but in their own lives as well. Intriguing Futures is designed to allow students to embrace and overcome personal challenges towards leadership, unlocking confidence in their abilities, thus relishing their responsibilities. This course leaves students feeling empowered, ready to lead themselves into their very own Intriguing Future.

The afternoon saw the pupils put their own skills into action through softball, tennis skills, basketball skills, bike skills and more teambuilding opportunities. A great day where even the weather held out to ensure that the pupils had a well-rounded introduction to the start of their S6.

### House Captains 2018/19

At Gleniffer High School we have four houses which are represented by two house captains per house; Chloe Caddis and Calum Ferguson for Brodie, Yasmin Jose and Keira Kelly for Glen, Katie MacLeod and Cameron Muir for Moredun and Rachel Wilson and Zoe Williamson for Thornly. Each house has a different charity that the house captains raise money for throughout the year by organising a variety of events. The house charities are as follows; Brodie- Lymphoma Association, Glen- The British Heart Foundation, Moredun- Accord Hospice and Thornly- Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity.

The first charitable event of the year was the Foodbank appeal which took place in the week beginning 8<sup>th</sup> October 2018. Throughout that week pupils from across the school brought in nonperishable items to donate to the foodbank, with the last day being the biggest drive as on the Friday pupils were asked to bring in food items equivalent to £1 for the opportunity to wear their own clothes to school. Thornly absolutely dominated this event with at total of 1801 items donated, second was Brodie with 1229 items donated, third was Moredun with 1145 items donated and narrowly last was Glen with 1128 items donated. Together with 5,303 items collected this smashed the previous record of total items donated to the Renfrewshire Food Bank by Gleniffer High School.

The next event on the calendar for the House Captains was the S1&2 Halloween Dance. This an extremely popular event with the two youngest years as they get the opportunity to miss class on a Wednesday afternoon. Lots of S1&2 grabbed at this opportunity as the first sum of money was raised for the house charities as a total of £461.15 was raised.

An extremely important event was up next Anti-Bullying week 2018. A key part that the House Captains played was having an interview with a RespectMe employee and creating a video all about the steps that Gleniffer High School has been taking to try and prevent and help victims of bullying. The video is still available on the RespectME twitter and website.

A brand-new charitable initiative was created by one of the Thornly House Captains Rachel Wilson – personalised Christmas chocolate bars. The other House Captains would take the orders while Rachel would personally design them at home on the computer then once complete they would be delivered out to the teachers by the other House Captains. This went down a storm with the teachers who thought it would be the perfect stocking filler for Christmas morning with some teachers even buying up to six chocolate bars! The total money raised from initiative was £185.40

Christmas time was a very busy time of year for the House Captains due to balancing the chocolate bar sales and the G Factor the most well-known school event. The G Factor is were pupils audition with their variety of different talents to get through to the grand final which is in front of the entire school. Although mostly ran through teachers the House Captains did get themselves involved with a few of them managing to get along to auditions to help with the judging, selling the tickets for the grand final and most embarrassingly along with the pastrol teachers filmed a carpool karaoke to keep the crowd entertained while the judges were deciding the winner. The total money raised for the charities from this event was a massive £606.85

Unfortunately, due to lack of teacher availability and pupils being busy with coursework and tests in the run up to Easter break the Spring Fling could not go ahead. However, the House Captains did manage to get a Mini Spring Fling for the junior school pupils which was a great success with the pupils very excited to skip class for one afternoon. The Mini Spring fling added a healthy amount of money to each charities fund with a total of £205.78

The House Captains were given an excellent opportunity to judge the YPI house finals in March 2019 for their respective houses. YPI is were groups of third year pupils from all the houses chose different charities that they believed should be granted £3000 and they create a short presentation to present to their PSE classes and the judges- the House Captains. It was an extremely difficult decision for the House Captains to make as only one group from each class could go through to the grand final which the House Captains were again given an amazing opportunity as they get to host this brilliant event.

As the House Captains come to the end of their reign they have been working with the head teacher Miss Chalmers to help improve the house system before we leave. All the House Captains have been creating new ideas to improve house identity as well as giving feedback on practices that are already in place as to how we would like to see them improved. We are appreciative of the opportunity to give our opinions on this important system within our school.

Overall, the House Captains have worked extremely hard this year to raise money for their respective charities. The total amount raised is £1,459.18 which will be split equally between the four house charities with each receiving at total of £364.80
