## Senior Phase Family Learning Event – Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> January

We had a really interesting and insightful session for staff on how to support Care Experienced young people within our school. At the session three young adults who have been through the care system spoke to us all about their own experiences and what it was like for them growing up in a Children's Unit, Foster Care and in Kinship Care. Their remarkable stories really had a positive impact on the staff present and made us reflect on our own practice.



## Parents in Partnership

Our Parents in Partnership (PIP) programme is well underway and we have taken a different approach this year to this great programme. Instead of a 6-week intensive block between September and October, we have spread our programme out across the school term from September to May. Parents are invited into school twice a month to experience a number of different activities and workshops, including lessons in cooking, science and sessions regarding My World of Work amongst other things.

The programme has extended this year to include information on issues such as mental health and self-harm. At the beginning of the session we invited parents in to discuss what they felt they would like to know more about and as a result we tailored the programme to reflect some of their wishes.

This year we also had an award-winning comedian, Anna Devitt, in to deliver a confidence and self-esteem workshop. During this workshop pupils and their parents were working together to build their confidence through a variety of different activities led by Anna. At the end of the workshop the parents and pupils felt that they had positively benefitted from the event.

# Parent Surveys

At our S1, S3 and S5/6 parent's evenings we asked parents to give feedback on how they feel their child is doing in Gleniffer High School and how we are doing in supporting them. It is very important that we seek the views of all our stakeholders to ensure that we are doing our best to support the young people in our care. Over the three parents' evenings, 128 parents completed the survey. The questions have been taken from Education Scotland's parental questionnaires. Below are our results. # Senior Phase Information

We held our S5/S6 Parents' Night in November, giving parents/ carers the opportunity to discuss pupil attainment with class teachers. I hope that pupils are now well underway with revision and study, following the strategies for support discussed on that evening.

We will host a family learning event for pupils and parents/ carers in senior school (S4- S6) on the evening of 22<sup>nd</sup> January- 6.30pm – 8.30pm. The aim of the event is to offer support to pupils and families with the process of exams and preparation for exams. The event will take the format of workshops and short presentations and we hope that many parents/ carers and pupils will come along to this event.

Senior pupils continue to work well in classes in preparation for Prelim Exams in January. Higher Prelims start on 13th January. We ask that pupils arrive in good time to register for exams. Study and preparations should well underway.

S5 pupils will complete Option Choice for S6 during January and February. Pupils will be issued with the Senior Phase information booklet and options forms when they return after the holiday. Mrs Prentice will give further details of the process at an assembly in the New Year.

This is an important year in the life of our young people in Senior school. There is a need to balance work and play. Pupils thinking about Prelims need to plan some time to relax and recharge the batteries over the festive period, so that they can return to school on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> January refreshed and ready for work.

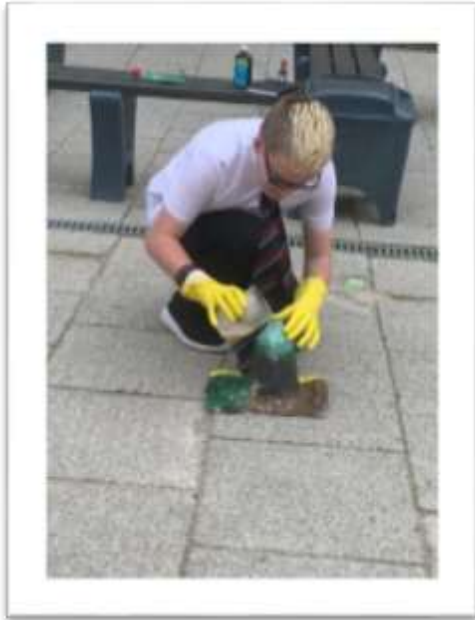

## 'S4 RMPS Mosque Trip

On Tuesday 29<sup>th</sup> October the S4 RMPS class enjoyed an informative tour of Glasgow Central Mosque to try to get a better understanding of the Islam section of the National 5 course. Pupils visited all areas of the mosque including the prayer halls, the washroom and the courtyard. The imam gave detailed explanations for how the mosque is used by Muslims and what the purpose of each feature is. He also talked about how and why different Muslim practices such as prayer, wudu (washing), fasting and veiling are performed. Pupils were very much encouraged by him to ask any questions that they had. The answers that he gave have been very beneficial for the pupils, as it allowed them to understand how important the beliefs and practices that they have been studying are in a Muslim's everyday life.'



## Westminster Parliament Visit

The Modern Studies Higher class had the exciting opportunity to visit the Westminster Parliament on the 24<sup>th</sup> of October. Amid rumours of a General Election being called, we travelled down to London by train and braved the London underground to Westminster. The pupils were given a tour of the Parliament and got the chance to watch a live debate in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords. They then took part in an interactive workshop before participating in a question and answer session with Mhairi Black, MP for Paisley and Renfrewshire South. The pupils discussed a variety of topics and Mhairi Black was extremely impressed with their knowledge and the quality of their questions. We then travelled back to Glasgow, completing a long but very worthwhile day.



## Lessons from Auschwitz

In November myself and Matthew Dickson had the opportunity to take part in Lessons from Auschwitz. The programme takes two S6 pupils on a day trip to visit the Auschwitz concentration/extermination camps in Poland. We visited both Auschwitz I and Auschwitz II Birkenau. The experience of visiting these two camps is one that neither of us will be able to forget. The things we witnessed and were told are still difficult to process and understand. We were given a tour by one of the guides from the Auschwitz Memorial Museum, the stories of real people's experiences in this camp were so difficult to hear and to even begin to try and understand how they would have been feeling was unthinkable. It was hard to imagine the millions of people who lost their lives right in the place where we were standing and that is why the trip was one of the hardest things, we have both ever tried to deal with emotionally. What we learnt and experienced has completely changed how we view the Holocaust and how we think about this time in History. We are both so grateful for the opportunity we were given to visit Auschwitz as it was indescribable

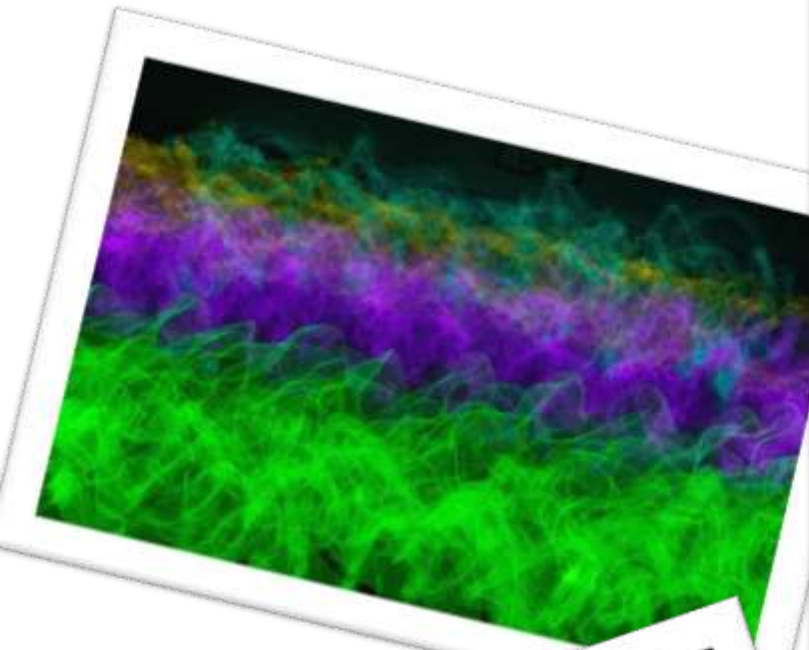


# Photography

# Gleniffer's Successful Foodbank Appeal

Our Food Bank appeal was a tremendous success; a total of 5227 items of food was donated! The event took place between the 7<sup>th</sup> – 10<sup>th</sup> October. It all started in a competition by the different House Groups, and by the Wednesday, we had already collected 543 items.

Food banks are all over the UK and distribute food to those in need. At least 1 in 5 of the UK population live below the poverty line and these food banks are an essential lifeline. Food is donated from schools, churches, businesses and individuals.

As a school, instead of bringing in a £1 for non-uniform, pupils brought in items that added up to a £1. Even if we didn't bring in items, we could still put a £1 in a bucket to support this cause.

The House Group breakdown: Thornly collected over 1180 items, then Brodie with 967. Moredun followed closely with 834 and Glen was not far behind with 820 items. Another 1426 items were collected by fundraising. House Points were awarded and if you brought in 5+ items, you would get a platinum token! Significantly, out of all of the schools in Renfrewshire, we collected the most for the food bank!

## Flexible Work Placements

Throughout this year a number of our pupils within the senior phase have had the opportunity to participate in flexible and extended work placements designed to help them achieve a positive destinations in Higher and Further Education, Apprenticeships or employment. Kenneth in S4 has been working with Kustom Kruizers in Renfrew, a community bicycle building project, that teaches youth and young adults between the ages of 13 and 21, how to strip, build and restore bicycles. Having already taken part in the Bikeability course at Gleniffer, Kenneth has excelled in his extended work placement, and hopes to take the skills he has developed into a full-time position after he leaves school.



We are continually looking for diverse DYW opportunities like these for our young people and have been undergoing development work with Education Scotland to enable pupils to receive academic credit for taking part in work placements.

Pupils met employers from across STEM related industries to inspire the future workforce in a fun and interactive way.
