

College Applications

This year we are unable to organise College Workshops to support pupils with college applications. However, we are still here to help in any way we can.

Dates Applications Open

Tuesday 12th January – West College Scotland <u>www.westcollegescotland.ac.uk</u> Wednesday 13th January – City of Glasgow <u>www.cityofglasgow.acu.uk</u> and Glasgow Clyde www.glasgowclyde.ac.uk

You should apply as close to these dates as possible as courses fill up quickly

How to apply

Once the applications are open, you should go to each individual website to apply for your chosen courses. You will need to create an account for each College that you apply to. Go to 'online application' on the website and follow the instructions. If you need help to decide which courses to apply to, please email your Careers Adviser asap to arrange to speak to us.

Make sure you have or expect to have the entry requirements for your chosen courses. If in doubt you can apply for 2 levels (i.e., NC and HNC) and the College will decide which they feel is most suitable for you.

We advise you to apply to more than one College. This gives you a better chance of getting in and if successful in all courses, you can chose which College and course suits you best.

Preparation before applying

Before applying, you should ensure you know exactly which courses you plan to apply to. Make sure you read over the course information, entry requirements and future prospects carefully.

Have your SQA certificate handy as you will need to list the qualifications you have and also those you expect to gain this year.

If applying to College as a progression route into University, check you are applying for the right course at College to help you to progress.

Draft a copy of your personal statement and email it to your Careers Adviser to be checked over. Try to do this before we finish up for Christmas.

If you feel you need help to apply to College, please contact your Careers Adviser and we can arrange an appointment to help you with the application.

Student Council Black History Month

Throughout October, this year's Student Council at Gleniffer High School have been working hard to honour Black History Month. The annual celebration of the achievements of black people was an initiative Head Girl, Ebo Anyebe, was keen to implement in the school calendar.

To recognise the many fields black people have had a huge impact upon, the Student Council wrote letters addressed to each Department Head, asking for their involvement in Black History Month. This included ideas for lesson plans and specific topics we felt should be covered under the scope of their subject.

Additionally, in preparation for October, a small group of the Student Council worked together to produce informative posters and noticeboards detailing topics such as How to be an Ally to the Black Community, the history behind Glasgow's street names and a "Did You Know" poster with statistics highlighting evidence of systemic racism in Britain. The organisation and commitment of Student Council members was a huge part of pulling together the final plans for Black History Month.

Each day in October, the school collectively recognised a black icon in the scientific, creative or sports industry. This included teachers of period 1 classes reading out a small biography of the daily black icon and the class discussing what kind of adversity that specific black icon faces throughout their career, which their white counterparts do not. We used this activity intending to make discussions around race and racism more of a comfortable topic within the school community. The black icon was also posted daily on the Student Council Twitter page (follow us for regular updates @gleniffersc). From Jane Bolin to Stormzy, all pupils were able to gain insight into the unique struggle the black community face.

Alongside this, pupils also received class lessons on topics regarding racism throughout their entire curriculum. This included watching movies such as "Hidden Figures" in Maths to learn more about the underrepresentation of black people in the STEM field and learning about the impact of the transatlantic slave trade on black people today in Humanities, to name a few.

Overall, this month opened many pupils' eyes to the deeply rooted racism in our country and world. The Student Council hopes that this initiative continues to shape a school attitude that normalises allyship and solidarity with the black community.

The first fundraising event was S1 Movie and Art rooms over the last two periods on Thursday. The fundraising from this will be put towards our chosen House Charities.



My aim:


The idea of my project, is planning and presenting a Fitness circuit class to my fellow classmates at Prolife fitness centre.

What we have already completed:

We aim to have the project completed by the end of January, and have the paperwork done by February. This would allow us to complete the course in plenty of time. This will also allow for us to have the December holiday to sort out any minor issues that should arise.

Environmental Science – new this session!

Recently, both Higher Environmental Science classes went on a field trip to the Gleniffer Braes to collate experimental data for topics we had been learning about in class. We trekked up the Braes, our wellies caked in mud and headed to three different areas: a river, a pond and an area of grassland. In our sub-groups, we performed three different experiments — we used quadrats and indexes in the grassland to sample population type and size, we used pond dipping and kick sampling to sample the river and pond species and we used nitrate strips to measure the nitrate levels in these areas. The general idea was for us to compare different sample areas and their pollution levels. In our groups we worked as a collective, splitting up tasks and recording our information. The trip was highly enjoyable, albeit a bit muddy, and during the break we even got to warm ourselves with a nice hot chocolate. Overall, the trip was an interesting opportunity to explore and investigate our own local area and get to see at it in a completely different light.

Sport Ambassadors



As sport ambassadors, our aim this year is to help increase the participation of pupils within sport to 40% in order to achieve the Gold Sports Award. This is crucial this year as many sport clubs/ trainings have been called off and cancelled due to the current pandemic and COVID-19 restrictions meaning more and more children are becoming less active. As we are lucky enough to still have full access to facilities within the school, we should be doing as much as possible to keep all pupils involved and active by running extra-curricular activities during and after school.

Our plan throughout the year, is to split up the four terms into two. From August to December, we will be gathering information by working with pupils through the use of targeted focus groups and a sports council. The aim of the target groups is to be able to pin-point the factors and reasons for the decrease of pupils not engaging or participating in PE. From this, we are planning strategies to help minimise these factors such as particular extra curriculars and changes within the department suggested by pupils. From January to the end of June, we aim to put our plan into action with the help of staff, volunteers and our Active Schools Coordinator, Nicole Brown.

Our Sports Council have had their first few meetings which have been extremely successful, as they have allowed us to gather the opinions from both a girl's and boy's point of view along with their fellow peers.

We hope we are able to achieve the award to give back to the school however, also help make this generation more active to benefit their physical and mental health.

The Gleniffer PE shirt can be purchased from school uniform shops. Otherwise pupils are asked to wear a red t shirt with black shorts/tracksuit bottoms. Footwear must be suitable for participating in physical activity. Pupils unable to take part in PE are still expected to change into kit and can participate in other activities, including score keeping and refereeing.

Attendance

All teachers register attendance in class. Attendance is recorded twice a day by Renfrewshire Council, morning and afternoon.

Absence from school is recorded as authorised, approved by the education authority, when a parent/ carer provides an explanation for the absence. If there is no explanation by parent/ carer, the absence is recorded as unauthorised (truancy).

We ask that all parents/ carers let the school know by letter or phone call if your child is likely to be absent for some time. Please give your child a note on his or her return to school, confirming the reason for absence. This will allow us to record an accurate account of pupil attendance.
