SQA Update




Given the uncertainty in the last two years, there was always going to be some trepidation around SQA exams. I am pleased to say they ran smoothly and we didn't hear too much controversy from pupils as they spilled out the exam hall and rooms. Congratulations to the S4-6 pupils who completed their SQA courses, whether internally assessed or through a final exam. I have to thank staff who worked with young people tirelessly throughout the year to ensure they were fully prepared and confident walking into the room.

Now it is the waiting game! Learners can sign up to receive their results by SMS on Tuesday 9th August, if they can't wait for the mail to arrive on the same day. A small group of staff will be in school on Tuesday 9th August and the morning of Wednesday 10th August to offer support with requests for appeals. Should you need an appointment to speak to someone about an appeal (usually over the phone) please call the school office on 0300 300 1313.

Young people who wish to change subjects based on SQA results, can also make an appointment during these times and we can see them in the building or have a phone consultation to discuss their options.

There will be no staff available on Thursday 11th August for appeals or options, however some members of SLT will be available on the first in-service day, Friday 12th August.

Parent Council & PTA



At the end of last year we made the decision to join the Parent Council and PTA due to low numbers. The group have met online throughout the year and finally got to meet in-person on 6th June for our final meeting of the session. At the start of the school year we recruit for new members of both Parent Council & PTA. I will send out a link at the start of the year but thought it might be useful to share the function of each group.

Parent Council

The Parent Council helps to create an environment where all parents know that their views matter, and where they feel confident and comfortable putting them forward. They work on behalf of all parents to discuss educational matters that are of importance to all. They do not get involved in individual matters relating to children or staff in the school. I attend all Parent Council meetings and give a HT report. I also invite other staff or pupils to attend to share information about the work of the school. Occasionally some parents or carers will contact the Chair of the Parent Council to request information about specific aspects of work in the school.

PTA

The PTA is a group of parents and carers who organise activities or events to support the work of the school. Some of the fundraising activities have led to improvements in the school library, contribution to S6 Leavers' Dance, contribution to awards ceremonies, development of our learning hub or supporting sporting events. I attend all PTA meetings and work alongside members on fundraising projects.

Next year we hope to recruit new members for each body. We will initially all meet together, but hope that with enough support from the parent body we will be able to operate as two distinct groups.

An invite to both Parent Council and PTA will be sent out at the start of the new term. We hope to see many new faces at our first meeting!

Parent Council and I would like to thank Iain Mackenzie very much for his service to Parent Council. Iain's youngest son has now completed his sixth year and he now retires from Parent Council. Not only has Iain been a loyal, consistent and supportive member of the council but he has also worked closely with groups of pupils making a difference to our community with regular litter picks. Iain has volunteered to keep working with us next session and we have happily taken him up on this offer.

BGE Sports Day



On June 9th, the PE department were delighted to host our first formal sports day since COVID struck. A fantastic day was had by S1, 2 & 3 pupils who qualified for the BGE Sports

Day. Qualification took place during the 5-week block of athletics in PE. Staff recorded all scores and those who met the criteria were able to compete on the day.

A highly competitive field saw points achieved for qualifying for "Finals" through various "Heats" for each event other than 800m and 1500m which were straight finals. Each competitor earned 1 point per event qualification and then scored within each final to contribute to an overall "Sports Champion" for each year group.

Below are all the results and, impressively, several new school records being broken. Pupils highlighted in Green were the year group Sports Champion. Pupils highlighted in blue, broke the Gleniffer school record.

Enrichment Programme



Between the 26th of April and 20th of May, S4 pupils not undertaking any formal exams participated in our Enrichment Programme, providing opportunities to develop their self-confidence and employability skills, as well as gaining an additional National 4 Qualification in Personal Finance. This year we had a record number of pupils sitting one or two exams opt-in to the programme, highlighting how valued it is. Pupils had the opportunity to set up professional email accounts, write CVs, practice applications and undertake mock interviews as well as numerous other activities. The highlight of the programme was a visit to the Renfrewshire Chamber of Commerce "Business to Business" event where our pupils impressed with their confidence and interest, so much so that the group were invited to attend a formal Networking Working lunch run by the Chamber. Thanks goes to the many businesses who supported the programme, with special thanks to Morrison Construction, for a massive input in supporting our young people. We hope that the programme will help our pupils achieve a positive destination post school and pleased to report that two of our participants have now gone on to training positions with a view to a Modern Apprenticeship as a direct result of their attendance.

Developing the Young Workforce



On Monday the 30th of May, 15 new S3 pupils attended a Traditional Building Skills event hosted outside of Paisley Town Hall by Morrison Construction, working in partnership with Renfrewshire Council and West College Scotland.

It was a practical event which saw a number of traditional building workshops for students to get involved in and also included a tour of Paisley Town Hall. This event was in place for students who have an interest in construction and provided an opportunity to showcase careers in traditional building but also the many other careers in construction. There was a talk from Morrison Construction about the career options they offer, West College Scotland about vocational options and Foundation Apprenticeships and Renfrewshire Council discussing both the Foundation and Modern apprenticeships.

The pupils really enjoyed the event commenting that it showed that "...there is a lot more to construction than you think!"







Timetable Change/Options Re-negotiations

Out timetable changed on 30th May for all pupils. While technically still in the same year group, pupils moved on to their timetable for next session. Mrs Prentice has been working tirelessly to meet with pupils who want to discuss their timetables and organise consortium and college placements.

Following the publication of SQA results on 9th August, some pupils may wish to reconsider their subject choices for next year. If this is the case, appointments can be made with members of the senior leadership team to discuss the best curriculum plan for them.

SCQF - Scottish Qualifications Framework

Earlier this session we were the first school in Renfrewshire to achieve the Bronze SCQF Award. This was awarded due to the work we have undertaken in educating pupils, parents/carers and staff on the qualifications framework, highlighting the curricular and accreditation pathways open to all learners in Scotland.

A group of S6 learners became our SCQF Ambassadors and led work in this area alongside Mr Madden, Principal Teacher of Attainment. We were absolutely delighted to be able to showcase a wide range of pupil work from the 2021-2022 Academic Year. With a plethora of creative art, design, photographic and construction pieces on display, pupils, parents, staff and our wider community were able to come and appreciate the very positive learning which is taking place in our Art and Technical departments.

This year, for the first time, we have introduced a National Progression Award (NPA) in Drawing for S3 Art pupils and an NPA in Visual Communication in Graphic Communication and Design and Manufacture. These additional opportunities have been positively received and executed and successfully dominated many of the excellent works which were on display. Two of our selected S2 classes took part in an IDL Materials World project, which involved working with external companies; Remode and Screen Scotland. Here the pupils learned about global issues, focusing primarily on fashion and material sustainability. They looked at how to reuse fabrics and make better choices when it comes to buying clothes in order to reduce materials waste. With this, they learned about the weaving process and ways to reuse plastic as well as learning about various film making techniques, including how to use stop motion animation to portray their messages. Pupils produced excellent work on the project despite the time constraints they were faced with because of Covid earlier in the year. The project concluded with two of our pupils (and teachers) being filmed and interviewed by Screen Scotland. 
Science Trip

Our uniform policy promotes school identity and equity. The uniform is designed to be affordable. It is however important that families entitled to Footwear and Clothing Grants, apply at https://www.renfrewshire.gov.uk/article/3338/Free-school-meals-and-clothing-grants. This link will also allow you to apply for **Free School Meals**.

Our school environment is comfortable and therefore we expect that pupils remove outdoor jackets in classrooms, ready to learn. All young people should have a school bag to carry equipment, including PE kit.

Uniform items include:

- White shirt worn with school tie. S6 pupils wear the senior tie and blazer.
- Black trousers or skirt. We ask that leggings and trackies are not worn to school although may be worn while taking part in PE.
- Plain black jumpers or cardigans.
- Black footwear.

Red Gleniffer PE tops can be purchased in all schoolwear shops and are easily washed and dried (no ironing required!) I would also recommend that pupils bring spare socks and a towel on a wet day for PE. Pupils unable to take part in PE are still expected to change into kit so that they can help with other activities such as refereeing, which allows them to be part of the lesson if physically unable to join in.
